Mental Health Services

• Since April 1st, 2024, the County of Renfrew has partnered with Mental Health Services of Renfrew County (MHSRC) to address high-content homes, a problem identified in several of their rental units.

Over the course of this partnership, significant progress has been made, particularly in the area of knowledge mobilization among Renfrew County Housing Corporation (RCHC) staff. MHSRC delivered specialized training on topics including hoarding and high-content living, the Buried in Treasures framework, behavioural change and cognitive processing differences, concurrent disorders (mental health and addictions), and system navigation and referrals within Renfrew County.

MHSRC Caseworker Lisa Schuler provided individual assessments, interventions, and recommendations to RCHC tenants. Between April 1, 2024, and March 31, 2025, MHSRC recorded 346 tenant interactions and received 57 new referrals.

On April 29th of this year, Caseworkers Lisa Schuler and Carolyn Gendron from MHSRC hosted an inter-agency meeting at the Arnprior Library, bringing together 29 participants from 15 community

organizations across Amprior and the surrounding area.

The purpose of this meeting was to establish a shared understanding of hoarding and highcontent/squalor situations. Using case scenarios, participants explored agency roles, responsibilities, and the critical importance of collaboration.

A comprehensive resource package, featuring key terms and definitions, the Clutter Image Rating Scale, an informational booklet, and a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), was distributed to support ongoing inter-agency coordination.

By the end of the session, attendees had a clearer understanding of their role in addressing these complex situations.

As a follow-up action, MHS will seek signatures for the Memorandum of Understanding from each agency which will demonstrate their commitment to continued partnership and collaborative response moving forward. MHS will also create a resource pathway to address each agency's role and the supports they can offer in high content/squalor situations. The plan will be to continue these inter-agency meetings across Renfrew County to ensure similar practices and collaborative care across all agencies and towns.

Moving forward, MHSRC plans to continue hosting inter-agency meetings across Renfrew County to promote consistent practices and enhance coordinated care among agencies throughout the region.

Epic Go-Live

We recently shared that the new go-live date for all six hospitals, including ours, will be Saturday, October 24, 2026.

Primary Care Team Proposals In Development

As an update to the government's recent call for proposals for new or expanded Primary Care Teams in designated areas, I recently shared that the Ottawa Valley Ontario Health Team worked



with members of the Primary Care Network and partners on proposals for postal codes K8A and K0J as OHTs were directed to submit proposals on behalf of local providers. The final deadline for submission to Ontario Health was May 2nd and results are expected this summer, with implementation to start soon after, so much more to come!

Visual Improvements At PRH

Over the last several weeks, I had the opportunity to tour a number of individuals around our hospital including the CEO from the Heart Institute, donors and most recently, Deep River and District Health CEO Janna Hotson who all had many nice things to say about PRH and the services we provide.

On each tour, it was noticeable how many visible improvements have been made over the past several months including coats of fresh paint, improved organization, reduced signage, renovations and more. I know that many of you have worked hard in your own areas to see this through to completion and the results are amazing!

Trillium Gift of Life Network (TGLN) Celebration

It was nice to see a number of you join us in the cafeteria April 17th as we recognized our hospital's long-standing commitment to organ and tissue donation and celebrated the fact that, in the past fiscal year, your dedication to this program resulted in seven tissue donors who were able to enhance the lives of many.

I was also very proud to share that we once again received the Routine Notification Rate Award for achieving a 100% routine notification rate throughout 2023/24. In total, our staff made 126 notifications to Ontario Health (TGLN), making us one of only four hospitals in the province to achieve this award. This is an incredible accomplishment.

We also recognized some of our frontline staff who have been actively involved in the notification process over the past year. These Hidden Heroes have shown exceptional dedication and commitment to organ and tissue donation by making three or more notifications in the past year.

On April 23rd, as part of the Senior Leadership Team's monthly Gemba Walk, members of the Pharmacy team hosted an information session on the department's new BD Pyxis C2 Safe.

This new equipment enables the team to electronically trace the journey of all medications from arrival at PRH to storage in the individual Automated Dispensing Units (ADUs) on each Clinical unit.

Previously, much of this work was conducted manually by team members.

The new processes associated with the C2 safe have resulted in increased efficiency for Pharmacy staff and enhanced safety measures designed to protect patients and ensure accuracy within each drug's Pharmacy to patient journey.

Its robust reporting capabilities allow for real-time tracking and quick identification of discrepencies while ensuring that units have what they need when they need it. It can also produce pro-active reports that indicate which drugs need to be reordered.

Team members shared that the technology has great auditing features, with the ability to print variance reports throughout the day and access very specific reports when looking into discrepencies.

Also, a number of clients were identified as having an existing Disability Tax Credit Certificate on file with CRA even though they had not self-identified as having one. Claiming this on their 2024 tax return entitles them to receive the new Canadian Disability Benefit starting in July, as a DTCC is required in order to qualify for this benefit.

In total, Sheila spent over 160 hours preparing these tax papers for clients, supported through countless hours by the caseworkers who worked with the clients on their tax packages and the clerical staff who prepared the tax packages and assisted Sheila. Special thanks to all involved!
